## MWBC News and Upcoming Events

**Announcing an American Baptist History and Polity Workshop** — Have you ever wondered about some of the distinct practices shared by American Baptists, or how and why we differ from other denominations? You are invited to a one-day **American Baptist History and Polity Workshop** on Saturday, August 5 from 9 am to 4 pm, sponsored by the American Baptist Churches of Ohio and hosted in the ABC Ohio office at 136 North Galway Drive, Granville, OH 43023. **Rev. Timothy Mohon**, noted American Baptist historian and Associate Regional Minister for the American Baptist Churches of Ohio, will be the presenter. He will help workshop participants understand our history as Baptists in America and how that history has led American Baptist churches to adopt our current practices and embrace the beliefs we now hold dear. The cost of the workshop is **\$25** for one person, or **\$20** per person if more than one person is attending from the same church. The registration fee covers lunch and instructional materials. This course may also be taken for credit by ordination candidates and those attending the Ohio Leadership Academy.

**Racetrack Ministry** — SEM Food Pantry coordinates a racetrack ministry in which different local churches provide a meal for workers at the track each Monday evening during the racing season. Our church has agreed to take a turn on Monday, August 14, from 5:45-7:00ish. We will need to prepare food for about 30 people and have a team of around ten people who are willing to go to the racetrack to serve dinner to the workers. ## Music



If anything the events of the last couple of years have taught us is the importance of relying on God for help, strength, and guidance. As our church continues on the path to a new senior pastor and the understanding of God's will for the church, the song "All the Way My Savior Leads Me" reminds me whom we need as our leader for current and future ministries of the church. The song was written by the great hymn writer Fanny Crosby. Psalm 37:23 — "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord: And He delighteth in his way" — is the scriptural reference for the words she wrote. It was written as a result of an experience she had following her gratefulness for God's monetary answer to a financial need. Finding that she needed five dollars desperately, she, as was her custom, prayed to God for an answer to this need and God sent a stranger with the money to her. She composed this poem thanking God and expressing how the Lord leads us at all times, no matter our needs, and that we can rely on this bounty without doubt. Our faith gives us strength even at times when we are tired and weary. Our Savior will guide our church now and in the future as we face trials because Jesus does all things well, as Fanny wrote in the chorus. She knew trials herself, having lost her sight at the age of six weeks through a failed medical treatment. She met her husband, who was also blind and a famed musician, while attending the New York School for the Blind. She began writing gospel songs in her forties after a successful career as a secular musician and became, in her words, "the happiest creature in all the land." We need to take her example ourselves, since she only wrote her songs after intense prayer to God, seeking guidance as we seek guidance for our church, its ministries, and the community we serve. Our Savior will lead us; we need to believe, ask, and follow His way.

## Missions

### Big News from the Osterbrocks!

Dear friends and partners,

Every decision that we make in life takes place within a confluence of circumstances that work together to point in a certain direction that helps us to discern God's will. For over twelve years, Aaron has sensed God's call to pursue a PhD in Biblical studies. When we finished our MDiv and ThM at Gordon-Conwell in 2015, he wanted to get pastoral experience before we went on the overseas mission field (a call that he had felt since he was 19). It wasn't the right time to pursue a PhD. In 2018, God led us to Sabah Theological Seminary, which at the time was looking at expanding its English track to serve more pastors, including international students from around SE Asia. . . . We were excited about the potential for multiplication of our ministry in Malaysia and the surrounding region! Unfortunately, this vision hasn't eventuated. The pandemic hit, and one of the ongoing effects of this is decreased seminary enrollment (globally), as well as more students choosing to study online rather than in person. . . .

On one hand, ministry is NOT about numbers. Life and ministry are about faithfully and wholeheartedly following God wherever He leads and serving in the ways that He has called us to serve, be they among many or among few. But at the same time, we are aware that the needs of the world are great, and we sense that the extremely low enrollment at STS, in the English Track, makes our position here unsustainable in the long term. . . . In addition, Aaron strongly feels God calling him to pursue a PhD in Biblical studies, which will open doors for more and better ministry in the years to come. He has a deep desire to grow as a student of God's Word and to be further equipped to teach and preach and train others at a higher level. [So, after much thought and prayer and talking with both STS and International Ministries, we have decided that we will continue to serve with IM through August 2024, at which point we will take a break to pursue Aaron's PhD.](#) While continuing to teach online for STS, Aaron will also be looking into PhD programs and potential supervisors in the US. He will apply for PhD programs in January 2024, and then, Lord willing, be accepted to and begin one in September 2024. . . .

We still very much have a heart for the nations and we love cross-cultural ministry, so we anticipate that God will call us back overseas when Aaron's PhD is done. We have always sought to faithfully follow wherever He leads, and He alone knows what plans He has for us. We also see the current slump in global seminary enrollment as an opportunity to skill up to be ready for future ministry when the post-pandemic survival mindset fades away and more people start enrolling in seminary again (which is our hope). If the Lord calls us overseas, we would hope to continue working with International Ministries as well as InterServe Australia. Our IM colleagues are like family and we anticipate serving alongside them with IM in the future. So . . . *stay tuned!*
