Self Talk | Pastor Clay

Darby and I had our first "major" communication snafu when she asked me if I had an article for the April newsletter. I looked dumbfounded (one of my skills), thinking we did a Lenten newsletter that would cover us until Easter. As I was preparing my decisive debate skills, Darby indicated Jim had turned in his April article on March 15th, as he always has one in by the 15th. Oh, the shame of it all.... What am I to do? Write the article. Darby 1, Clay 0, but who's counting? (The above introduction is mostly true and presented for your enjoyment.) (*Note from Darby: I think the score would be Jim 1, Darby 1, Clay 0. Just saying.*)

Easter is just a few weeks away, coming later this year, but still feels a far way off. I recently saw an ad for apparel with the slogan, "A lot can happen in seven days." I was curious, so I did a little digging and found out there is also a line of merchandise that reads, "A lot can happen in three days." Both lines of merchandise are

marketed to Christians; one emphasizes Palm Sunday to the empty tomb, and the other emphasizes the crown of thorns to the empty tomb. I like the seven-day emphasis better than the three days: let's take in all of Holy Week! Triumphal Entry, which was a huge party for people gathered for the yearly festival. It was anything but triumphal, on a beast of burden with no band or prepared speeches.... It was just weird. Maybe the festival wine helped the people celebrate, but they had no idea what or who they were



celebrating. Then Jesus messed with the temple and money changers, left to hide out with his close disciples and get in some private instruction time before the non-Leonardo DaVinci version of the Last Supper (or should it be called the first supper?), then arrest, trial, crucifixion, burial, and finally empty tomb happen...all in seven days. A lot happened in seven days, and I only hit the highlights. No one was ready for the first Easter, not even Jesus: "Father, please, if possible, take this cup from me."

I find comfort in Jesus' words of not wanting to suffer for the cause and yet trusting the Father. I find comfort that not a lot of preparation is necessary to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus the Christ, because a lot happened in seven days nearly 2000 years ago. I am also disturbed. What am I missing? Many of the people missed Jesus in his earthly days because he pleased them but did not conform to their view of a savior/ messiah. How much of Jesus do I or you miss today because we ignore the parts of Jesus that do not match our preconceptions? Please read, re-read the Holy Week stories in scripture before Easter, read with curiosity and wonder. As we do this maybe, with prayer, we will move in the direction of conforming to Jesus, instead of conforming Jesus to the image we created.

The Music of Easter

April finds us in the middle of Lent and then the celebration of Easter. The music of Lent has been more somber, quiet, and reflective. It reminds me of an autobiographical book I've read regarding the von Trapp family of Austria, *The Story of the Trapp Family Singers* by Maria von Trapp, which is the basis for the musical and movie *The Sound of Music*. After WWII, the family von Trapp built a home in Stowe, Vermont, which became the home base for their touring singing group. There is a chapel on the property, and the narrative in the book regarding Lent and Easter states that the chapel is quiet and dark during Lent as people come to pray and reflect on the sacrifice of our Savior. However, there is an undercurrent of excitement and joy barely able to be contained by all as they know that Resurrection Sunday is close and will be celebrated with joyful music and loud praises. "He is risen!," we sing with gladness and exuberance as we celebrate Christ's victory over death!

The hymn "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today," written by Charles Wesley, is one of my favorite Easter songs of joy and praise. It was sung for the first time in a deserted iron foundry in London, England, in 1739. The foundry, renovated and transformed into the first Wesleyan chapel, was called appropriately the Foundry Meeting House. Each phrase of the song is finished with an exclamation of "Alleluia!" as singer happily proclaim that Christ is risen from the dead, giving the believers hope for eternal life. All manner of creation, human and heavenly, rejoices in what has happened. Death has been defeated, love's redeeming work is done, and we believers will forever live again. Interestingly, the "Alleluias" were not written by Wesley but were added by someone later to fit the music tune. "Alleluia," or "Hallelujah," is an ancient Hebrew phrase of worship and became an expression of joy in the early Christian church. So, rejoice all, Jesus is risen, alleluia!

International Ministries Calls for Prayer and Support for Those Impacted by Myanmar Earthquake

ABCUSA's International Ministries has sent an initial grant of \$10,000 in One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) emergency relief to partners who are providing humanitarian relief to the victims of the earthquake that caused widespread devastation in central Myanmar on Friday, March 28, 2025.

The first earthquake, with a magnitude of 7.7, struck around 12:50 local time, according to the US Geological Survey. A second earthquake struck 12 minutes later, with a magnitude of 6.4. To date, it's been reported that more than 2,900 have died and more than 3,400 have been injured in Myanmar, although it is difficult to obtain accurate information. In Thailand, authorities reported localized incidents that have left at least 13 dead and 77 unaccounted for when a building that was under construction collapsed.

International Ministries (IM) is deeply concerned for the safety and well-being of its global servants, partners in the region, and the communities they serve. All IM personnel have reported they are safe, and IM is assessing the needs of its partners in Myanmar and their communities as the situation unfolds.

IM Chief Program Officer Rev. Jim Bell notes, "This natural disaster presents a need and an opportunity to stand with and support the body of Christ in Myanmar, which was birthed two hundred years ago through the work of IM's pioneering missionaries Ann and Adoniram Judson. Through IM's network of Baptist and other Christian partners, your giving will reach places and people likely to have no other sources of relief, and will bear testimony to the ultimate help and hope to be found in Christ."
